Last Sunday provided the perennial opportunity to step back and acknowledge mothers for the tremendous work that they undertake in supporting family life. A Mother's Day Mass was held at the College on Wednesday 5th May and it was both encouraging and moving to see mothers, grandmothers and even great grandmothers join the school community for this special occasion. I trust that all mothers were treated to a special day and that it was a time when enjoyment as a family was abundant.

In late November of 2009, two separate contingents of students and teachers from Sacred Heart College travelled to the Philippines and India, respectively, to observe and support the mission work of the Marist Brothers overseas. For three weeks members of the Sacred Heart College Community worked in schools and orphanages run by the Brothers and lived in the homes of the local families, to develop an appreciation of how life would be for children in poorer countries of the world. It was a remarkable insight and a memorable time for those who were involved; in retrospect, each would suggest that it was one of the most profound experiences of their life.

Part of the reason for the trip was to take much needed funds to support the work of the Brothers, funds which were used to buy the books, stationery and other essential supplies that we normally take for granted. These funds were raised during the Marist Mission March held earlier in the year, and, it is this activity which was undertaken on Monday 10th May 2010, in preparation for the Marist Immersion Experience in November this year. The whole school marched from the grounds of the College along the beach to Seacliff and back as a sign of solidarity with the poor, and in the process raised in excess of \$14,000, which will be taken up to India and the Philippines later this year. Part of being enrolled in a Marist school is to actively support the cause of social justice in our local community and throughout the world, and I commend all who participated so willingly in this school-wide event.

Congratulations are extended to the students who received awards for excellence and commendations at the Academic Assembly on Wednesday 28th April 2010. This event profiled those whose commitment to excellence across Semester 1 has been particularly meritorious. It is a timely reminder that examinations loom in a few weeks and the importance of systematic revision programs and structured study routines cannot be over-emphasised in optimising performance and success.

AN INVITATION TO EVERY CHRISTIAN ON THE PLANET

We were very fortunate to spend a Yr 12 RE Seminar morning listening to the many adventures that Tasmanian born, Sam Clear experienced on his amazing 564 day, worldwide journey. A journey which included 18,000kms travelled on foot, being robbed at knife point by a gang of thieves, stalked by a puma, racially abused, held up at gun point and arrested, twice.

The 2006-7 **Walk4One** pilgrimage began in Cape Branco, the eastern most point of Brazil; up through South America, Central America and North America; across Russia and down through Europe to Santiago de Compostela, Spain. The pilgrimage was a self initiated and self funded quest **to pray for CHRISTIAN UNITY**. Throughout his journey, Sam invited every Christian to join him to pray that the many Christian denominations unite in one truth - to unite in theologies, practices, experiences and belief systems. Following are Sam's words from the Walk4One website (www.ymt.com.au/walk4one) when asked why he decided to walk around the world?

"Quite simply, to draw attention to unity. The Church is the Body of Christ and it is broken. To peacefully travel the world praying and inviting prayer I hope, will encourage all Christians to embrace a desire to be united - completely. One love, One in Christ, One World. Marist Basketball Carnival



In the first week of second term boys and girls basketball teams from Sacred Heart competed in the 21st Australian Marist Basketball Carnival held in Traralgon, Victoria. Our boy's teams had enjoyed success in recent years, winning the tournament for the last three years but with no one from these teams still at the College and five Year 10 players it was always going to be a challenge to make it four in a row.

This proved to be the case with the team crashing out of the top eight after day one. However, well led by old scholar coach Scott O'Connor and sole Year 12 Nathan Kareta, the team rallied to win four games in a row and qualify for the final of the consolation Plate. The final game was a disappointing loss meaning that the team finished 10th out of 18 overall. The fact that 9 of the 10 players will be eligible again next year is a healthy sign for the future of Sacred Heart basketball.

Nathan Kareta's individual performance was recognised when he was named team MVP but also as a member of the Allstar Five. These players were considered the best 5 players in a tournament involving 180 players and Nathan deserved his inclusion.

The girl's team received an early setback with last year's team MVP Ashleigh Bow arriving on crutches and unable to participate. Despite this the girls went through their opening round undefeated including a strong win against perennial finalists Traralgon. This ensured them a top four finish but meant they played only the other top three teams thereafter. When Amy Shaw, who had been the tournaments top scorer, was also injured and the team reduced to only 7 players every game was a special challenge. The remaining girls were courageous but could not get past eventual finalists Traralgon and Sale. However they managed a gutsy 1 point win against Hamilton to secure 3rd spot.

Individual honours went to Amy Shaw who was named team MVP but was also named in the tournament Allstar Five. This was an exceptional effort for someone who only played half the games.

Finally, on behalf of the players I would like to acknowledge and thank Scott O'Connor for his expertise and untiring efforts as coach of the boys team and Ms Kaye Frearson for all her work as team manager for the girls (and often for the boys as well). It is a credit to them as team officials that Sacred Heart continues to have an enviable reputation both off and on the court.

MTA Group Training Scheme

The MTA Group Training Scheme (MTA-GTS) employs apprentices and trainees in all vocations of the Retail Motor Industry under Contracts of Training and use "Host Employers" to provide a wide but specific need to satisfy the requirements of the Contract of Training.

The MTA-GTS is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO) that delivers up front full time basic trade training for motor mechanic, panel beating and vehicle painting apprentices prior to being placed with a host employer. Therefore apprentices are productive to that host from the first day in their workshop.

ATN Test – an alternative pathway into IT or Engineering

Students interested in engineering or IT but don't have the maths and science background (or are afraid they won't get a competitive TER) check out the ATN test. The ATN test is a 2.5 hour multiple choice test which assesses a students' aptitude to think scientifically, solve quantitative problems, critically analyse information and display



interpersonal understanding. Developed and conducted by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER), the test is only offered by ATN Universities, UniSA being the only one in South Australia. Satisfactory completion of the ATN Test allows direct entry into the Associate Degree in IT or Engineering.
