Dear Parents, Caregivers, Students, Staff and Friends of the College,

The drenching rains that have given birth to new life have provided a refreshing return to school, as distinct from the searing heat that prevailed at the beginning of Term 1. The falls have not only greened our parks and landscapes, but have provided some much needed relief to boarding families who have experienced lean times over recent years. We pray for continued rains as the latter stages of autumn give way to the onset of winter.

Welcome back to the term; one that holds considerable potential for learning and personal development. I trust that all members of the school community enjoyed a refreshing break and that students have returned with renewed energy for the challenges that lie ahead. It is imperative that, in a senior secondary environment, all students have clearly defined goals and an established study program that will see them systematically pursued and achieved.

That there are many and varied activities on the calendar over the next 10 weeks can be attested to by a quick review of what lies ahead:

- Anzac Day and Mother's Day Mass, which will be held on Friday in weeks 1 and 2, respectively;

- Year 11 Driver Education, which will be conducted on a number of levels throughout the term;

Add to this the centrality of teaching and learning and it is abundantly apparent that it will be a busy time over the term ahead.

Over the holidays I was informed by the Province that the proposal to replace The Stables has been approved. This is an exciting project that will see the demolition of the school's oldest classrooms on the North Eastern boundary and the construction of state of the art learning environments, all with fibre-optic links for IT interface. Architectural drawings of the building are on display in Paringa Hall for parents and students who wish to view the design and aesthetics of the building.

On Friday 5th June the school will celebrate the feast day of our Founder – St Marcellin Champagnat. The day will begin with a mass, which will be followed by a 'mission march' to Seacliff along the foreshore of the beach. If each student can work assiduously to raise sponsorship for the event, we can raise \$20,000 to send through to Marist orphanages and schools in the Philippines and India; indeed, a sign of our solidarity with the disadvantaged in so many regions of the world.

Marist Basketball Carnival

During the recent school holidays a team of boys and a team of girls travelled to Lismore in northern NSW to compete in the Annual Marist Basketball Tournament. Twenty boy's teams and ten girls teams from all Australian states competed in this year's tournament and our boys as current titleholders were very keen to make it three in a row. The boys maintained their winning form through the qualifying rounds and faced the host school Trinity College in the semi-final. Despite the raucous home town crowd the Sacred Heart team eventually shrugged off a

persistent Trinity to face regular finalists Marcellin College Bulleen.

The Grand Final was a tense battle of wills with Sacred Heart ahead early only to see Marcellin adjust and take a small lead at half time. Marcellin led for most of the second half with Sacred Heart surging back only to have Marcellin respond each time until, with four seconds to go and Marcellin one point up Sacred Heart was awarded two free throws. Both shots missed but Corey Maynard, who had accumulated a massive 42 points, grabbed an unlikely rebound and scored. Sacred Heart had won its third consecutive title 77 – 76.

The girl's team faced the eventual grand finalists Lavalla College and Sale in the first two games of their round robin competition and lost both effectively putting them out of grand final contention on the first day. They were very competitive in both games however, highlighted by the fact that they beat the other seven teams, most of them very comfortably and faced St Francis Xavier in a playoff game for third spot. Despite a slow start, some exceptional defence by Taylor Falting on the tournament's leading scorer and some excellent offensive work by Ashleigh Bow, Madi Quigley and Ali Seuteni saw Sacred Heart with a commanding lead by half time and a comfortable win for third place.

Sacred Heart also gathered some individual honours in the tournament with Corey Maynard being named the boys tournament MVP, Michael Lustica being named in the Allstar Five and coach Scott O'Connor (an old scholar) gaining Coach of the Tournament honours. For the girls Ashleigh Bow was named in the Allstar Five.

Congratulations to both teams on their excellent performances and exemplary behaviour again this year and to all the winners of individual honours.

PISA at SHCS

Our College has been successfully selected to participate in the 2009 Programme for International Student Assessment, sponsored by the OECD (Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development.)

PISA is the world's largest survey; happens once every three years; surveys students aged 15; and focuses on the skills necessary to cultivate life long learning. The PISA testing assesses students' preparedness for adult life. The testing will take place during Term Three.

PISA provides five key benchmarks for the quality of education systems: overall performance of education systems; equity in the distribution of learning opportunities; consistency of performance standards across schools; gender differences; and foundations for lifelong learning.

In Australia this year, approximately 10,000 students will be selected to partake in the PISA assessment, equating to approximately 48 participants from each school. This year, 70 countries have committed to join the 2009 assessment. The three domains for assessment are reading literacy, mathematical literacy and scientific literacy.

Courses and Careers Corner

YEARS 10, 11 & 12

Work Experience

BEFORE CONSIDERING WORK EXPERIENCE PLEASE BE AWARE OF THE FOLLOWING:

It is a legal requirement that prior to commencing work experience students are inducted in the following areas: Occupational Health and Safety, Equal Opportunity and the Children's Protection Act 1993. Adequate time (approximately 3-4 hours) should be allocated to cover these topics effectively and students need to demonstrate their understanding.

In addition to this, the work experience form must be signed by the student, parent/guardian, work experience supervisor (all arranged by the student) and finally the principal (arranged by the school). The **original** (copies or faxes are unacceptable) work experience agreement form then becomes a legal contract which sets the school insurance cover in place and must be retained by the school for a number of years.

The school must also provide a contact person who is responsible for each student for the duration of their placement.

Work experience is a very valuable experience for most students however; it does take time to ensure that the above expectations are met. We are happy to accommodate students in the times allocated, please do not cause yourself or the school embarrassment by making other arrangements and then asking for exceptions to be made.

Students who wish to do work experience during 2009 are advised that the dates are:

6th – 10th July

Deadline for paperwork 9th June

28th September – 2nd October

Deadline for paperwork 1st September

30th November – 4th December

Deadline for paperwork 27th October

Work or job trials are not sanctioned by SA work experience guidelines.

Undergraduate Medicine at Flinders

Bachelor of Clinical Sciences/Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery.

From Semester 1, 2010, Flinders University will be introducing an undergraduate pathway to Medicine, through the Clinical Sciences streams in the Bachelor of Health Sciences or the Bachelor of Medical Science.

This pathway will provide 25 school leavers the opportunity to study the first two years of an undergraduate degree with a clinical sciences emphasis and, subject to passing all topics and maintaining a Grade Point Average of at least 5.0 (credit),

guaranteed entry into the four year BMBS. Students will graduate with a Bachelor of Clinical Sciences/Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery. The combined degree pathway will take six years to

complete and is offered on a full time basis only. This pathway to Medicine is open only to school leavers and to those applicants who **do not** have an academic record of study at University. Applicants with completed university studies should consider the graduate-entry pathway into the Flinders Medicine program.

Application

Application for the undergraduate medicine pathway course is via the South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC) – www.satac.edu.au Applications will open on Monday 10th August 2009.

Applicants will need to:

- complete the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE), International Baccalaureate, or interstate equivalents
- undertake the Undergraduate Medicine and Health Sciences Admission Test (UMAT).

Selection

It is expected that applicants will require a minimum Tertiary Entrance Rank (TER) of 95, including Flinders SEAS and RISAS bonus points. Visit flinders.edu.au/schools for bonus point details. Ranking for offers of places will be based on an Entry score combining TER (90%) and a UMAT-derived score (10%) which will be based mainly on Sections 1 and 2 of this test.

Optometry at Flinders

Bachelor of Medical Science (Vision Sciences)/Master of Optometry SATAC Code: 214931.

Pre requisites: Stage 2 Chemistry and Physics.

For students interested in Optometry, a new pathway will be introduced at Flinders in 2010. Students will begin the Bachelor of Medical Science (Vision Sciences) in 2010 with **guaranteed entry** to a two-year Master of Optometry if students maintain a Grade Point Average of 5.0 (credit) for their undergraduate program. The Bachelor of Medical Science (Vision Sciences)/Master of Optometry will involve five years of study and fills a crucial gap in South Australia. Previously, students have had to move to Queensland, NSW or Victoria to gain optometry qualifications.

Application

Application for the Optometry course is via the South Australian Tertiary Admissions Centre (SATAC) – www.satac.edu.au Applications will open on Monday 10th August 2009.



Applicants will need to:

- complete the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE), International Baccalaureate, or interstate equivalents.
- undertake the Undergraduate Medicine and Health Sciences Admission Test (UMAT)
- meet the course pre requisites.

- 68% of drivers/riders killed or seriously injured in rural South Australia live in regional areas.
- The direct cost of road crashes to South Australia is estimated to be approximately \$900 million each year. This does not account for the immeasurable grief for families and friends of those killed or seriously injured.

Cars have changed ... So have the Road Rules.

The South Australia Police will be conducting a free 90 minute presentation aimed at providing information regarding laws, trends and facts which affect drivers on our roads and you are invited to attend.

Dear parents / care givers

Statistics for drivers and passengers aged 16 to 24 years show an imbalance in serious injury and fatality road crashes. This trend has the ability to impact on your child's school and the general community.

Statistics over recent years have shown:

- Young drivers are up to three times more likely to be involved in a crash
- One young driver will die every fortnight in South Australia
- 6 young people are injured every day in crashes in South Australia
- Persons aged 16 to 24 years, make up 12% of the population but account for 28% of all road fatalities and 31% of all serious injuries.

As parents, we provide much of the initial education to your children in relation to the 50 hours of supervised driving they are required to perform prior to applying for a Provisional licence. As parents, we sometimes may not have an up-to-date knowledge of the Road Rules and we often underestimate the risks that young drivers face today.

In 2007 there were 168 Learner drivers involved in a casualty crash, whilst P1 licence holders were involved in 1,829 casualty crashes. Research has found that strengthening the driving experiences and quality of supervision of new drivers can lead to significant reductions in crashes both before and after obtaining a driver's licence.

To help parents deal with the current changes in Road Rules and to have a better understanding of the risks young drivers face, SA Police will be conducting a 90 minute presentation aimed at the parents of children who have just obtained their licence, are about to obtain a licence or are likely to travel with a driver aged 16 – 24 years.

The aim is to assist in the education and training of young drivers by providing the 'supervising driver' with information regarding laws, trends and facts which affect novice drivers on our roads.

Dear Parents and Potential Student Participants,

The Sacred Heart College - Assumption College Exchange has been an annual program since 1957. Over the years students have competed in a range of activities that have reflected the extra-curricular activities of the two Marist Schools.
